Commemorative Parade

On Saturday 21st May 2022, a parade along the High Street followed by a memorial service at St Mary's church was held to mark the 40 year the anniversary of the date HMS Ardent was attacked in 1982 during the Falklands war.

Twenty two men lost their lives in the attack including Richard Dunkerley, aged 22, from Stalham, on 21st May 1982.

The community came together to give thanks and remember his, and others, sacrifice and it was an honour to represent Stalham residents alongside fellow councillors and lay a wreath on behalf of all residents.

The parade was organised by the Royal British Legion and an attendance in excess of 200 people, including members of the RBL,

veterans, service associations, armed forces, cadet forces, and youth groups showed the level of respect locally for this commemoration.

The service in St Marys Church Stalham was led by Rev Richard Jackson, with Legion and Association flags and it was there that wreaths were laid in tribute to Richard Dunkerley and those who died during the conflict in the South Atlantic.

After the service, refreshments were provided at The Swan Inn where many stories were told by past serving

District & County Councillor Report

Tesco Junction Safety. The one enduring challenge during my time in the role has been no real progress to improve the safety of the A149/Old Market Rd (Tesco) junction. My latest attempt highlights the fact that NCC Highways and NNDC Planning Dept have approved 4 major housing schemes in Stalham, amounting to well over 300 homes, without asking for road network or junction improvement funding from the developers. Highways refuse to recognise the poor accident record/ safety, the driver fear and the 'rat running' it creates through Sutton St and other local roads, simply to avoid using the junction. Moreover, they claim there's no funding for a roundabout or traffic lights. If the incremental impact had been recognised then each development would have raised enough money to at least pay for a traffic-lights controlled junction. This amounts to professional negligence by Highways who recommended the approvals and a failure to make proper infrastructure provision for the people of Stalham and Sutton. Such a traffic-light solution could also offer the prospect of a better pedestrian connection between the Town and the Staithe - with significant safety and economic trading benefits. I am working closely with Stalham TC and Sutton PC to help make the case to improve this junction and that the local road network desperately needs investment to improve both capacity and safety.

Wayford Bridge Closure. NCC Highways are planning major work on Wayford Bridge possibly starting around 12 Sep and lasting 3 to 4 weeks, based on 7 days a week/24hrs a day closure. This will have a serious impact on travel with traffic diversion via Potter Heigham, Ludham and Hoveton. I will explore options to close one lane only with traffic lights, although this would possibly double the work period but would greatly reduce the traffic diversion impact.

Local Infrastructure Update



The Town Council is keen to continue work on a programme of providing seating options throughout the Parish. This has been in hand for some time with the latest addition a wheelchair/pushchair friendly bench on the corner of the Staithe next to the Museum of the Broads (pictured right). There is a path across the grass to the bench, and it is already proving very popular with walkers and visitors to that area of the Town.

The two Churchyards in Stalham are 'closed' churchyards, which means that there are no longer burials taking place, and although the land remains with the Diocese, the responsibility for looking after the area outside of the footprint of the Church now rests with the Town Council. The gates have recently been replaced both to the smaller churchyard on





Campingfield Lane (pictured right), and also to the main Churchyard from Brumstead Road (pictured above), many thanks to Rob Turner Wrought Iron Work in Stalham for his fabulous work.


70+ Glorious Years of Stalham in Photographs
