Neighbourhood **Development Plan**

Stalham Town Council has enabled a steering group comprised of both Councillors and local residents to work alongside a consultant to create a Neighbourhood Development Plan. Any interested residents are welcome to come along to any of the meetings or get involved. Next Meeting 20th October, 4pm at Stalham Poppy Centre.

Since the completion of the consultation process the group has been gathering evidence which the plan can be created from. The group has also identified, assessed and mapped green spaces and green corridors for the benefit of wildlife.

Members have been mapping views in and around the town and have started to look at our heritage buildings. This evidence will allow key characteristics of the town to be identified and included in the plan with a view to preservation and enhancement.

To help us with this, we have acquired a grant to enable professional assistance to carry out a Housing Needs Assessment and Design Code report. These experts are coming to assess the High Street and design of our Town with yet another group looking at the housing needs in Stalham.

North Norfolk District Council has a housing crisis and members have met with District Planners to discuss these issues. In the next month or two we will begin to draw up some ideas about what we can do to ensure that Stalham remains a "Rural Town" with a strong community in a spectacular environment.

Where does my water come from?

The Town Council has recently met with Anglian Water who have offered the following information for residents;

Many blockages are avoidable - we are asked to be mindful of what is flushed down the loo or put down the sink. Unflushable material put into the sewer network can make its way to our treatment centres and has to be removed and sent to landfill - the only part of the process that cannot be recycled.


Wet wipes, sanitary waste, fats, oil and food scraps in sewer pipes can have a significant impact on the environment, resulting in blockages and flooding. It is the responsibility of householders, holiday-makers in the area and businesses to make sure the pipes from homes and businesses are kept clear to allow the used water to flow freely to its ultimate destination for treatment. Pipes which only carry used water and the **3Ps – Poo, Pee and Paper (toilet paper)** are self-cleansing, they will not block, emit horrible odours or attract rodents. Those that do block pose a threat to the environment when the sewage escapes and is not only highly distressing and detrimental to the area but is also deadly for fish and wildlife if this gets out into water courses, rivers or the sea.

Flooding / operational incidents

We have our <u>In Your Area</u> website which shows live incidents and planned investments across the

region. We would encourage customers to regularly check this site and sign-up to for the latest updates in their area. You can set up automatic alerts so if anything does happen where you live we will send you a message.

The Norfolk Strategic Flooding Alliance was set up last year by the County Council headed up by General Lord Richard Dannatt following the serious flooding over the winter of 2020/21. Norfolk residents now have a one-stop-shop to report flooding with more information on the website, www.norfolk.gov.uk



How to contact us

For operational issues such as clean or wastewater flooding from our pipes or water supply / quality problems customers should telephone us on 03457 145145. This will ensure a job is raised for our technicians to investigate.

For any pollution reports we encourage customers to use Pollution telephone line on 03457 145145. For billing queries customers can call us on 03457 919 155 or if people are having problems paying their bill we have a dedicated support line on 0800 169 3630.

We also have a meter installation helpline on 0345 850 5852, where customers can get more information about having a meter installed.

We are always keen to encourage customers who are in vulnerable circumstances to join our Priority Services Register, which is easy to do on our website www.anglianwater.co.uk. This will provide customers with additional support during incidents (bottled water for example) and additional financial help too.

Given the current situation with high temperatures, very low rainfall, and talks of a drought in the UK, it's a very topical subject! We have plenty of advice on our website www.anglianwater.co.uk, which I'm sure will help customers not only save water (so important at the moment) but also save money if they have a water meter.

ST FURSEY'S ORTHODOX CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY & PARISH CHURCH

St Fursey's Orthodox Christian Community purchased the disused police station on Yarmouth Road in 2018 after some alterations, two of the smaller rooms were knocked into one to become a temporary place of worship until the church was built.

The Byzantine style of architecture, with its round arches and domes, has a spiritual meaning, that God is with us, and the dome signifies the heavenly firmament, and the cross reminds us of all that Christ has done for us. The officers of the North Norfolk District Council planning department were very interested in the designs of the church and were very supportive through-out the building process. St Fursey's Orthodox Christian Community are very thankful for this.


St Fursey's Orthodox Christian Community belongs to the Antiochian part of the worldwide Orthodox Church. Patriarch John X our current leader is the 167th successor to St Peter as Bishop of Antioch. Fr Stephen was ordained priest in 2011 in Paris.

It is not generally known that Anglo-Saxon England was Orthodox until the Great Schism in 1054. St Theodore of Tarsus (St Paul of Tarsus) became the 7th Archbishop of Canterbury 668-689 came from Antioch.

The church had a very successful Open Day in June and another is planned for September. St Fursey was originally a monk from Northern Ireland, he came with his two brothers and two friends as a missionary to Norfolk in 630, and was given the Roman Fort Burgh Castle to be his monastery.

How lucky we have been this summer with such lovely sunshine for the holiday season.

Staying in touch with our neighbours is particularly important at the moment as covid cases are prevalent in older people, and it seems to be a particularly nasty version- not life threatening but similar to a very nasty bout of flu. Please remember to get your flu jabs and if you are offered another booster covid jab, please take it.

I joined the protest group which assembled just off the A149 to bring attention to the dangerous driving conditions on our stretch of road from Watford Bridge to Catfield recently. I have been trying for 10 years to get something done about the Market Rd/A149 T junction as this is a major cause of frustration and hold ups at busy times. I don't think a roundabout is in the offing but I am arguing that lights would help to slow the traffic and bring some order to that junction. Similar arguments were made about the Catfield/A149 junction, but to no avail. Stalham and Sutton are both seeing increased use of the old Yarmouth Rd and The Street, Sutton as rat runs, as traffic tries to avoid the Market Rd junction.

Due to the problem of Nitrates and Phosphates leaching into our fresh water supplies all new buildings have been suspended until Natural England has come up with some mitigation ideas to help builders address the problem of surface water run-off. Unfortunately this will take some time, and could affect some developments until after Christmas.

The local Stalham street fairs have been a great success - I missed the Town council fair unfortunately, but was able to enjoy the Vintage Fair with lots of other people. The seats and refreshments in the church, pubs and restaurants were greatly appreciated!

I feel privileged to live in Stalham- people pay to come on holiday here and we have the broads on our doorstep and the sea a 10 minute ride away! Do get in touch with me if you have a problem that you would like to discuss. I may not have the answer, but I can try and find a man who does!
